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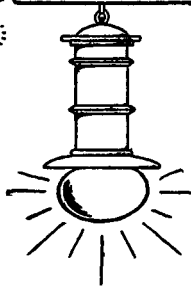

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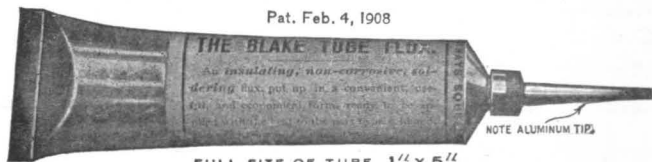

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Economic Power Dominates

Several years ago when the annual convention of the American Federation of Labor was held in St. Louis at the same time as the National Rivers and Harbors Congress, one of the well known current periodicals published a review of the labor convention, commented on the ability of the delegates, the scope of the work of the convention and contrasted its policies with those of the National Rivers and Harbors Congress. The review ended with the question, which was an implied criticism: Why does not organized labor go to Congress? This same query was recently expressed in an editorial published in the New York World.

Each year that has gone by has made more evident the soundness of the principles which the trade unionists have followed. As the dynamic forces in the lives of the people stand out sharply in some test that cuts through to bed-rock fundamentals, the strength and the nature of economic power is revealed. Those who had the understanding to interpret such flashlight glimpses into the heart of things and who can sense the hidden currents that are propelling the forward surge of life, know that those who handle the tools and materials of production, have in their hands the great powers of the common life. Creature ability is that which gives men and women influence and value. Men and women who can do things have an importance and a power because of that ability.

Only from a superficial viewpoint does this emphasis upon creative power appear materialistic — because attention is focused upon the products created rather than upon that greater, more beautiful thing, the wonderful, mysterious, spiritual force that gives direction and purpose to physical forces in production.

The problems of those who handle the tools and who do the actual work of production, have been to secure recogni-

tion of the value of their creative services and to maintain the right of freemen to control their bodies and their individual powers while all the time endeavoring to obtain greater opportunities and facilities for personal development and activity. These problems are problems of economic relations between themselves and those who produce and those who happen to enjoy strategic advantages in the determining distribution of the returns from production. Only a powerful industrial force can maintain industrial justice and secure for those who produce adequate return for their services.

As individuals the workers can not exercise sufficient influence to maintain their rights or industrial justice, but united they have power in proportion to their joint intelligence, needs and aspirations.

The problems to be solved and the forces that will be effective are economic — hence the wisdom of the policy that the A. F. of L. has steadfastly pursued. There have been many other advisers, some sincere, others actuated by ulterior purposes, who have advised their wage-earners to put their faith in the ballot and to "go to Congress." But politics is concerned with providing opportunities, maintaining the right to activities, establishing ways and means by which things can be done — politics does not enter directly and intimately into industrial relations. Politics is a secondary force in industrial affairs.

Every day is demonstrating that the center of power has shifted from politics and government to industry and commerce. Political power is only reflected power — reflected from the economic.

This transition makes organization of industrial relations for the establishment of ideals of justice of transcendent importance. It makes the meeting and the deliberations of representatives of mil-

lions of wage-earners of very great significance to the nation and to the whole world.

The matters that are to come before the thirty-fifth annual convention of the American trade union movement are of general concern. They are intimately interwoven with forces and conditions that have a determining influence upon the future of our nation. The decisions of the coming convention will be closely followed by those who understand the present age, for they are of greater importance to a larger proportion of our

people, now and for all time than the decisions of any other organization.

Of course Labor will "go to Congress," but it will be for the purpose of securing the largest degree of freedom to exercise the necessary normal activities of the workers for economic betterment; for the constructive work which the government alone can enact; and to voice the new demand for Labor's complete disenfranchisement from every form and fact of unfreedom and inequality before the law.

PRACTICAL HINTS

SWITCHBOARD CONSTRUCTION.

Many kinds of imitation marble switchboards are on the market but like cheap gold plated brass they soon lose their polish.

The features of a good board are:

- (1) The provision for the removal of lugs for meter testing.
- (2) The proper division of the load with proper switch control.
- (3) If demand indicators or other measuring devices are used make allowance for them.
- (4) Busbar capacity for future additions.
- (5) Extra switch space allowance.

The plan of switchboard wiring for alternating current work depends upon the system in use and this may be either of single phase, two phase, three phase, or monocyclic types. The general principles in all these cases however are practically identical.

The assembling of a switchboard depends on the size of the plant, varying from the simple task of mounting a single panel in the case of an isolated plant, to the more difficult problems of supporting a large number of panels in a central station. Small unit panels reduce the breakage cost in shipping and help to make switchboard alterations easy.

Fixture Hanger's Notes.

In whatever way the illumination may be provided it should be somewhat adjustable. Circuits should be left lightly loaded so that lamps of greater candle power may be given to those with very trying work for eye sight. It is wasteful in electrical energy as well as productive of much eye strain to compel all employees to work by the same illumination regardless of the work at hand.

If the circuits are properly laid out it will always be possible to drop an extra lamp of small candle power where it is needed.

Manufacturing concerns are using many types of adjustable fixtures for ceiling and side wall outlets. With these adjustable light fixtures the light can be reflected in any desired angle.

In department stores with clean white ceilings the indirect fixture makes a very good lighting unit. The gas filled lamp is a very efficient lamp for indirect lighting units.

Gas companies are trying hard to overcome the lead in new lighting business made by electrical contractors and fixture contractors are pushing the sale of alabaster glass bowl lighting units.

Solderless fixture joints are not passed by a number of electrical inspectors.

Underground Construction.

In pulling in cables a protector should be placed at the mouth of the duct to prevent abrasion. If a metal protector is not available one can be made out of a piece of leather.

A cable should not be bent in any radius smaller than ten times its diameter.

Do not permit a cable to hang over the sharp edges of the duct. Support it in the rack.

If planks of any sort are used to support cables in the manhole they should be creosoted, to make them durable.

Best practice calls for brick or concrete cable supports. Iron brackets well painted with water proof paint have been widely used.

Several cables should not be placed in one duct, the cables are installed easy and are pulled out easy but many times are ruined by the operation.

Paraffin should never be used in pot-heads nor in any filling where rubber-covered wires are used, on account of its detrimental effect on rubber insulation. Furthermore cracks are liable to develop in this kind of filling which will admit moisture into the first head.

Some advantages are claimed for single duct tile among which are flexibility and greater facility of handling.

In underground work the leakage of gas mains through the earth and its accumulation in manholes is a source of danger to be constantly borne in mind and before striking a match or taking a torch into the manhole, gas should be pumped out by the inverted umbrella made for that purpose or by use of a screen of cloth placed over the manhole on the side opposite to that from which the wind is blowing.

Cable Splicer Kinks.

In locating faults in a cable if the grounded fault was of practically zero resistance and the ground connection between the fault and the battery also of zero resistance, the location of a fault would be easy.

It would then only be necessary to measure the resistance of the cable core up to the fault from both ends of the cable. As the core is of uniform resistance, the two results would be the same ratio as the lengths of the cable.

For example, let the total length of the cable be 10,000 feet and its total resistance 21 ohms. Measuring from end A the resistance to the fault is 14 ohms. From the other end B, the resistance is 7 ohms. Then 14 is two-thirds of the total length of the cable from A, or 6666 from A and 3333 feet from B, neglecting fractions.

But ground connections or faults rarely fulfil the above condition, in fact they usually vary from time. It becomes necessary to use a test such as the Murray or Varley or other improved test, which disregard the resistance of the fault.

Locating a fault by unreeling the cable.

In this method two insulated reels are used, or an insulated tank, a galvanometer, battery, etc.

One end of a cable conductor is connected to a galvanometer, the second terminal of the latter being grounded through a battery. The cable is wound from one reel to another, the slack passing through the water in the tank. As soon as the fault reaches the water, the galvanometer will be deflected by the current flowing through the circuit including galvanometer, battery, ground fault and cable.

If an insulated tank is used, the ground connection of battery and galvanometer is made to the water in it.

Metal sheaths are used on rubber covered cables to protect the insulating compounds from the deteriorating effects of electrolysis and various kinds of acids and gases which, under present methods of construction, are ever present in underground conduits. It is a fact, however, that the lead sheath on a low ten-

sion cable, which is used as one side of a grounded circuit, has been in some cases the cause of, instead of, cure for electrolysis. The proper cure lies in the omission of the sheath altogether, but as this is not practical except in the case of very large conductors, the best thing that can be done is to interrupt the continuity of the sheath by some form of insulating joint.

Notes for Shopmen.

Locating and correcting trouble on a repulsion induction motor can be made easy by a systematic plan of working.

If after motor has been installed, or changed for other than standard installation or rotation, disassembled to supply new parts, it fails to start or has low starting torque; shows a low full load speed; takes excessive current or heats excessively; or sparkers abnormally; the trouble can be located most easily by running the motor under no load.

Gas Engine Magneto Hints.

The brushes should bear firmly upon the commutator and yet be loose enough in the holders to feed freely.

Occasionally where carbon brushes are used a glossy coat will be found formed on the brush and commutator, stopping the flow of current. This can be removed by applying a piece of fine sand paper to the parts after which the magneto will be usually found to be operative again.

If metal brushes are used they should be soaked in oil from time to time to prevent cutting.

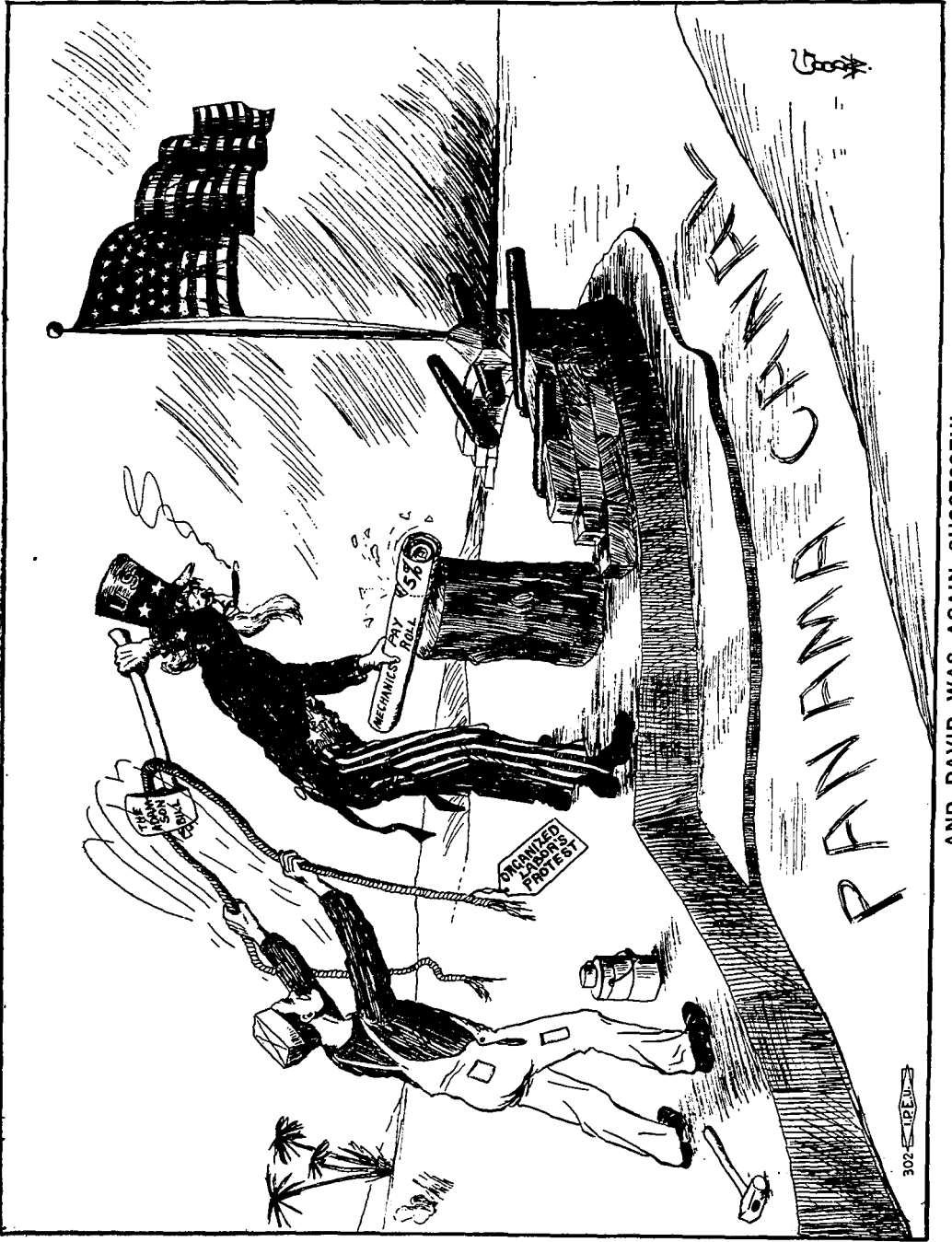

EDITORIAL



AGAIN THE CIRCULAR LETTER ARTIST.

Our attention has been called to several copies of a circular letter that is being sent to the various local unions, the contents of which will not enrich current literature to any great extent nor will the letter itself advance the interest of the trade union movement.

The requests or perhaps it would be better to say advice handed out, in our opinion, sounds a great deal like the advice employers are in the habit of giving to employees when they urge them to drop their union affiliations, for substantially that is the advice contained in the letter as it is urged that members stop payment of per capita until certain conditions advocated by letters spouser are brought about. It surely is sound (?) advice that no member with trade union blood in his veins will accept.

No one knows to what extent Mother Bell or some other corporation is responsible for the suggestion. In fact no one cares, as those who desire to start a flank movement will have to devise something new and original if they wish their ideas to be taken seriously.

Mr. Electrical Worker has had plenty of this brand of dope fed him in the past to last a life time and has no desire for any more.

To think for a moment such efforts would be taken seriously would be an insult to the intelligence and trade unionism of the members who stand ready at all times to defend the I. B. E. W. from attacks whether they be from within or without.

No one questions the right of any member or local to convey their legitimate views or ideas to the general membership. That is a privilege we all are entitled to and should insist upon but we question the sincerity of purpose of any member or group of members who advance the ideas contained in letter which it is claimed was sent out by Local No. 380 of Provo, Utah.

UNCLE JOE WOULD ORGANIZE.

When Uncle Joe Cannon, long the Czar of the National House of Representatives undertook to berate a speaker at Edwardsville, Ill., Oct. 18th this year when the new Madison County Court House was dedicated, he made one startling admission. He was asked:

Do You Believe in Labor Unions, Mr. Cannon?

He answered: **Well, if I worked in a mine or anywhere I should cooperate with my fellows for the betterment of conditions. Lawyers and doctors do it.**

Some statement, Uncle Joe, for a man who long ruled the greater part of our National Assembly for years.

But we ask could any man with the slightest pretention of brains have answered otherwise?

No, it was not because of his wish to be popular with unionists for in the same speech he said:

"There are three million (3,000,000) workers probably five hundred thousand (500,000) of whom are not in Brother Gompers's Federation. But I have seen Gompers sitting in the gallery and Reverend Senators taking to the cloak rooms, saying, "Can not this thing be taken from us?"

Good boy, Uncle Joe. If that's true and we believe it is Gompers sitting there earned more than his year's pay if he did nothing but sit there.

If organized labor has for its leader a man who makes some of the reverend senators pray to be relieved of his presence and watchfulness then we say, thank God for a Gompers. May we have more and more of them.

DIFFICULTY Ever since the formation of the Brotherhood efforts
BENEFITS. have been made to establish a comprehensive difficulty benefit that would be sufficient to support the members when called upon to defend their rights against the encroachments of unfair employers or where it is necessary to suspend work to procure improved wages or better working conditions.

The first real opportunity for the membership to decide if they desire benefits of this character is now presented to them for approval or rejection by referendum vote.

The question is of great importance to the organization and the result is awaited with much interest, not alone on the part of those of our members who are favorable to the proposition, but also by the employers throughout our jurisdiction. It may seem strange to many that any one not a member of the organization would take any interest in this matter, but such are the facts. It is safe to say there is not an employer who is the least bit antagonistic to the Brotherhood, but is hopeful that the proposition will meet defeat, for the reason that they realize the more defenseless our position the more advantageous is theirs.

We are fully satisfied that if difficulty benefits are once established that the members would never consent to any change in the constitution that would discontinue the arrangement.

We urge all to give this question their most earnest consideration and weigh well its importance.

THEY'RE A story worth repeating was told at our convention
ORGANIZED. by the private secretary of the mayor of St. Paul in his welcoming address:

A Southern negro was displaying his skill with a bull whip by cutting heads off of flowers and tearing bits of paper to pieces with the cracker and enjoying the plaudits of the throng of less skillful negroes when one of the crowd noticed a hornet near its nest, and suggested that Ike jest pop it in half with his whip. The whip expert looked and said, "You'll pick out sumpin else, nigger. I aint gone to monkey none with that Mr. Hornet, **they're Organized.**"

Mr. Nigger knew he would have to deal with all the hornets if he injured one and so the lone hornet was safe.

When the employer knows that an injury to one workman will stir up the entire nest he may pick on other things but will let the workmen alone. Workmen will then be as safe as that one hornet. They may want to strike him but like Mr. Nigger, they'll take one look and say hit something else, boys, **they're organized.**

It's now up to our Locals to prove that there is nothing in the boast of the Stage Hands that they will do all the electrical work in all theaters or other places of amusement. The I. B. E. W. by its action on this matter stated emphatically that they were tired of repudiated or broken agreements and the I. A. T. S. E. in refusing to put the agreement to a referendum vote

of their membership, as they agreed to do, violated the agreement that was signed by their officers and approved by President Gompers of the A. F. of L., and, although the agreement was approved by their convention in Chicago, their Locals immediately afterwards showed their utter disregard for any agreement by coming out with a claim for all electrical work in connection with any theater or place of amusement. This, of course, means all amusement parks also. They will find that our Locals do not lie down so easily, and, since they lay the claim that *it all belongs to one Union*, let us show them and all others *just which one Union* all electrical work belongs to.

LAY**MEMBERS.**

We've often heard members of our organization as well as others refer to themselves as lay members. While we admit its good English, we never quite understood whether they meant they were members who were laying up something for the future or members who would rather lay down on the job while at work or were ready to lay down when the real honest-to-goodness members were stretching the harness to make better conditions for all the boys.

We may not be erudite (whatever that means) but our guess is that a hen or goose is about the most useful lay members of the animal kingdom.

Be up and at it. Don't put yourself in a class with the biddy or goose by being content to be just a lay member.

Our internal fight is now over. No longer will we spend our time and energy fighting each other. Now is the time to go after the fellow who took advantage of our weakened condition during our family row and grabbed all possible of our work.

We're now out not only to let him know our opinion of people of that calibre, but to take back what is ours by right.

We ask nothing for ourselves that we will not grant to any and all other crafts. But will always insist on getting the even break. Others may have their full rights of their work. We shall maintain and determine that electrical work belongs to the Electrical Worker.

For years past deep-thinking members of our Brotherhood have been advocating a Strike Benefit to be paid from the International Office. They set forth that a number of strikes were lost because of the failure of our laws to provide for this.

Now, since the membership at large have a chance to say by their vote whether we shall have it or not, let us see what value they place on the thoughts of those who advocated it. If they figure it as being worth the price of two bad cigars (10 cents) per month their vote will show it. If not—well, what's the use.

SAFETY**FIRST.**

A union is safe only when it is at all times on the job to protect its jurisdiction as well as its working conditions.

Every member is part of the local union and a local can be no better than its parts. Its up to every member to determine to be a committee of one to safeguard the present conditions until the chance comes to make better conditions for all.

When is electrical work not the work of the Electrical Worker?

John Henry Butinsky answers, whenever pirates of any class wants to do it.

You're wrong, John. The answer is never and the I. B. E. W. boys are going to prove it to you.

If you are absent from the regular meetings you will have no one but yourself to blame if you are not fully informed on the new laws that are out for referendum vote, it is up to you.

Is the demand for the Union Label increasing in your locality? If not are you doing your share?

Don't forget there is a neat little label that looks well upon all electrical work. Mention this to your neighbors. It won't do any harm.

The convention declined to give you a real editor so you will have to put up with our humble efforts for a while longer.

TELEPHONE NOTES.

September 29 marked the achievement of wireless telephony over a distance of 4,900 miles by "air line." The system had not been loudly advertised like many previous attempts at long distance wireless transmission of speech, all of which have been failures, but rather is the result of more or less secret investigation carried on during the past three years by the engineers of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company. The distance covered in this test is equal to that of Seattle, V. S., to Yokohama, Japan, across the Pacific Ocean. This system may be used in connection with the present commercial systems. For instance a party might talk from Washington to New York by wire and from there to a strip in mid-ocean by wireless. Before long one of our fair operators will be calling President McNulty or Secretary Ford by wireless. Who knows?

Since the first successful long distance wireless telephone conversation, another wonderful wireless telephone test was made, by an army officer from the government station at Arlington, Va., to Paris, France, and Honolulu, Hawaii, also heard the words spoken at Arlington.

A chorus of nearly 5,000 employees of the New England Telephone and Telegraph Co. sang "America" to an audience of several thousand employees of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. at the San Francisco Exposition. Special loud speaking receivers were used which could be heard clearly throughout the large auditoriums at each end. Upon the backs of every other chair in each auditorium was placed a transmitter making a total of over 2,500 transmitters at each end. The applause of the "Friscoites" could be heard by the "Bostonians" who in turn listened to the "Star Spangled Banner" sung at the "Exposition" and returned the applause across the continent.

Some of the readers may think I am getting hostile, but I am writing my way of looking at the situation and for the welfare of the organization. I would like to say a few words for the benefit of No. 712 of New Brighton before closing. Now, Brother Donaldson, he claims he does understand my little note referring to No. 712. Well, I am going to tell him in a very nice way and very plain, and he also says our scale is only \$4.60. I would like to let him know for his benefit that our scale was four-sixty, but since July 1 it is five dollars per day for Electrical contractors and six dollars for non-contrac-

tors, so you see he does not know much about our affairs, but he will know when I get through telling him what he is at a loss to understand. If he will note in the letter of last month's Worker, in which he refers to my note, the possibilities are that if Local Union No. 5 would insist on jurisdiction there would be no baby Local No. 712. We also wish to inform the brother that No. 5 is not encroaching on the jurisdiction of any local union. Especially when our members are working in Economy and Ambridge, Pa. Lyons, who was sent in here to straighten out the difficulty which arose among the cable splicers and helpers and the Municipal Light, and I will say he sure had a tough proposition before him, which he took hold of as soon as he

landed on the ground and laid down the constitution to the letter which resulted in the clearance of the big fog, that arose from said difficulty.

I shall now try and give you a brief history of same. L. U. No. 39 has for the last seven or eight months had a committee and the Business Agent going to City Hall meeting with the heads of Light Department, trying to get increases in wages along with a few working conditions for all employes of Municipal Light which I must state, did not amount to a thing outside of L. U. No. 39 being handed the old story wait and waiting. Well, of course, there was a lay-off and you can all guess who were the ones to be laid off. In case you don't guess right will tell you. The ones that were wanting better conditions, better known as agitators in the local union regardless of the civil service which they were all under.

Well, those brothers hit the box cars and the proposition did not look encouraging to the rest or L. U. No. 39.

About the latter part of September the Municipal Light had all kinds of cable on the ground which they started pulling in and splicing. Well, the splicers and helpers got together and figured it out there was about three months' work for the splicers and helpers and then the job would be through for some time so they decided it would be a nice chance to better conditions.

They drew up a letter asking the same conditions that L. U. No. 39 had been trying to get for months for splicers and helpers stating that after October 1 their services would not be available at the old rate of pay. It seems that the City Hall considered it a huge joke as they had been stalling the local union for months and did not take the splicers and helpers very serious which resulted in the splicers and helpers all walking off the 1st of October and the city has not succeeded in having their places filled as yet.

The Municipal Light has advertised in various newspapers over the country for splicers, and several splicers have responded which resulted in them having been put to work a policeman guarding the man hole for protection. When a splicer saw he had a cop at his man-hole he realized something was wrong and of course when informed the true state of affairs they all came off.

Several days ago they had a bunch they called splicers in the holes that did not know a thing about lead cable and when they saw what they were up against they wanted to come off. But were informed by foreman in charges to stay in holes as they wanted to make a showing, but these fellows even though they did not have a card came off. This is the proposition that Brother Lyons had

to settle and as per constitution he said the job was a fair job to L. U. No. 39, but never the less the splicers and helpers are appealing to the men that came in here as union men and they have succeeded in keeping them all off the job. Now it look like the city will have to come across with the splicers and helpers.

Now, brothers, when Bro. Lyons was in here last fall trying to flop us we were very much opposed to him although I must say he was square and above board, but the way he handled this difficulty he sure was right and showed he had the interest of the I. B. E. W. at heart.

The strike of the street car men against the Wilkes-Barre Street Railway Company is on in full blast, the men are out to a man and public opinion is with them in their strike for a little more

wages that every fair-minded citizen coincides, is due them, beyond every shadow of reasonable doubt, but which has been denied, by the Wilkes-Barre Street Railway Company, with is one of the best paying street railway systems in the world and whose earning capacity on its investments are enormous and more than ample to pay the 26½ or 27 cents per hour that has been requested by the men on strike; but it seems from the attitude of the company it will be a long fought out battle. They have imported strikebreakers here through tactics and Strikebreaker, Waddell's Agency, and Waddell is here on the job, the man who in the past has furnished strikebreakers in other parts of the country in time of industrial strife; but with wise leadership and conservative action coupled with the solid front the men are putting up and from the courage displayed by them I really believe they will win in the end. The result of this industrial strike is very important to the trade union movement, because its effect will be felt one way or the other in this community and it is up to the working men and woman of this valley and the labor movement, to use their influences and every priceable means within their power and by requesting all of the people to refrain from riding on the cars operated and run by the unfair work—men until this strike is settled one way or the other, and if possible to see to it that the men on strike win a clean cut victory in this their struggle for justices.

We have five Brotherhood linemen working for the Street Railway Company out of possible ten or twelve linemen three of them belonging to our local—and one from Pittston Local—and the other from the Scranton Local. I have tried repeatedly to organize them all, but to no avail. There are about two of them that won't join the local and if the others join without them they will be discharged immediately, so I might say the job has been lost to us for some time past, but at this particular time action speaks louder than words and enough said until later on, but I am on the job.

Our booster campaign is progressing slowly, and we are just as determined as ever striving for the one hundred per cent organization. We will send out a letter in the very near future to the contractors requesting them to meet a committee from the local and take up the proposition of a wage scale and working agreement for the inside wiremen and the prospects for a good understanding and working agreement at this writing look very bright.

As far as work is concerned everything is good, every electrical worker within our local jurisdiction is em-

ployed; although they are many of our good brothers floating or working away, from home, and some of them at least, who are working in the jurisdiction of other locals will, according to the constitution, have to deposit their cards in the locals of whose jurisdiction they are employed, and this we regret very much, but we cannot afford to infringe on the rights of other locals. Local Union No. 1 has been very generous with us, but there is a limit to everything and in my judgment they are the most imposed upon local union in the Brotherhood, but I never heard them complain.

There are nothing new in reference to the new light company's franchise, the decision of the Public Services Commission has not been rendered yet.

For some time past we are having plenty of sickness and accidents among our members and at the present. Brother W. F. Barber is on the sick list since September 24th last, but he is recovering nicely and we hope he will be around soon and be on the firing line as usual. Brother Barber is one of the most active and sincere members of the Brotherhood, and we miss his services very much.

Now that the convention is over and all is harmonious I am satisfied that President McNulty will have his organizing forces ready and in shape to put into operation from the very beginning the policy of organization as adopted by the convention. There is no question about the referendum.

I wish to quote an article of the Times-Leader of October 16, 1915, as follows:

'PHONE EMPLOYEES HOLD BIG MEETING.

Male employees of the Bell Telephone Company in Northwestern Pennsylvania held their first meeting of the 1915-1916 season last evening in the Chamber of Commerce rooms and listened to an interesting address by J. H. Crosman, general commercial superintendent, from Philadelphia. The Bell employees have formed the Northern Pennsylvania Telephone Society and nearly 150 members attended. The meeting was conducted by Charles A. Donachy of this city, and Frank M. Stanton of Scranton, newly elected president and secretary-treasurer, respectively. Mr. Crossman spoke of the development of the Harrisburg division, of which Wilkes-Barre is a part, during the last few years. His talk was followed by short speeches by the following other guests: George S. Reinohl, division manager, Harrisburg; John T. Harris, traffic superintendent, Harrisburg; H. C. Kunkel, plant superintendent, Harrisburg; C. E. Booser, division auditor of receipts, Harrisburg; C. F. Brisbon, district manager, Wilkes-Barre; E. G. Simons, district manager, Scranton.

It seems to me that it would be more appropriate for the Bell Telephone Co.,

to free its employes from bondage and allow them to join I. B. E. W. without endangering their positions. More fair play and less talk Mother Bell.

I also wish to quote an article of the Wilkes-Barre News of Oct. 5, 1915, relating the very sad death and burial of my cousin and loyal friend, Frank Lynch, as follows:

FRANK LYNCH BURIED.

The high esteem in which Frank Lynch who was electrocuted while at work in Pittston, was held, was attested this morning when many friends and relatives gathered to pay their respects. The funeral was one of the largest held in years on the Heights. The funeral cortege left the home of his mother on Coal Street, Wilkes-Barre, at 9 o'clock. A requiem high mass was celebrated in St. Mary's Church in South Washington Street at 9:30 o'clock by Rev. M. T. Shields.

There were many beautiful floral tokens sent by friends, and were carried by John Garrity, Anthony Lavelle and John McGlynn. A delegation of employes of the Bell Telephone and a number of electrical workers throughout the valley attended the obsequies.

The pall bearers were William Ruddy, Martin Lavelle, John Lydon, Joseph and John Maloney and John Ryan. Interment was in the family plot in St. Mary's cemetery at Hanover, where Father Shields concluded services.

The widow of the above deceased line-men makes the seventh widow in our midst and about twelve orphans, five of the deaths occurred from accidents and one death from natural causes. It is awful to realize that when a man leaves his wife and family in the morning in good and sound health and in the prime of life to hear that his life has been snapped out without a minute's warning. Such is life, and particularly, the fate of the electrical worker.

partisan and racial factions and divides the members into cliques, which is not in harmony with the principles of true unionism, or the obligations taken by the members thereof.

These methods are those of the practical politician in the interest of their masters, the capitalist-class, and should not be introduced in any convention which assumes to represent the working class. King Caucus has been the method of the political boss, which in the past has resulted in the enactment of pages of statute law which have often been a gross injustice, and worked great hardship on the members of trade unions.

The labor movement should avoid this pitfall which has wrecked many organizations, despite their platform or preamble.

The reign of King Caucus, practically denies the men any voice or influence in the deliberations

Governed by their bosses it goes to show that 535 is on the job all the time and that persistent effort will win, as the following copy from the Evansville Press will show.

Evansville Press.

Mayor Bosse's administration met defeat in its long fight to enforce the electrical ordinance Friday when City Judge Fritsch held the ordinance invalid. Gilbert Levick, Sixth-st, arrested in a test case on charge of working on the new Citizens' National bank building without a license, was discharged.

Judge Fritsch held that the council has no authority to require electricians to pass an examination and needs express authority from the legislature. This was the contention of the electrical workers' union, headed by Ed. Wilke.

Judge Fritsch admitted the city's right to inspect the jobs and refuse approval if they are improperly done.

Business Agent Antley had one of Spott Bros', non-union shop men arrested for working on a job without a Department of Electricity permit.

The Electrical Workers' Ball held Oct. 23, was a success. The dance ran all night. Grand March started at 10:30 p. m., and was lead by the chairman of the arrangement committee, W. Shepherd, under the direction of Floor Manager J. J. McCourt; 500 couples participated in the march. Over 900 tickets were sold and something like 4,000 people attended. We had with us our mayor, John L. Davie, and International Vice President Grasser. Our decorations were freely commented upon and said to be one of the best pulled off electrically in Oakland's new Civic Auditorium. They were left up one week and used by the Theatrical Mechanics Association masquerade ball, held October 30, who thanked us with favorable comment, and which helped to make their ball a success. The expense was about \$600 to our local and we cleared several hundred dollars. It is said this ball and the electrical effects could not have been

put on by individuals for less than \$1,500. The arrangement committee deserves thanks and Brother McCourt was among one of the first to propose this ball.

I understand the convention bolted for two days and by what I hear from talk and letters, there is some discontent and there are a few prominent members and some of the rank and file who would like to split us again. L. U. No. 595 did not get all she wanted and was turned down on some propositions and so did other locals and members. I think I voice the sentiments of a good many members that we are willing to stand by the majority and take our medicine and work for one Brotherhood of Electrical Workers. Let us broaden our lines, electric work in all lines for electricians, no matter what that person does electrically—he belongs to ONE union in the industrial field. I am not a reporter nor a story writer, so will close this letter, wishing all in the fold a prosperous winter season.

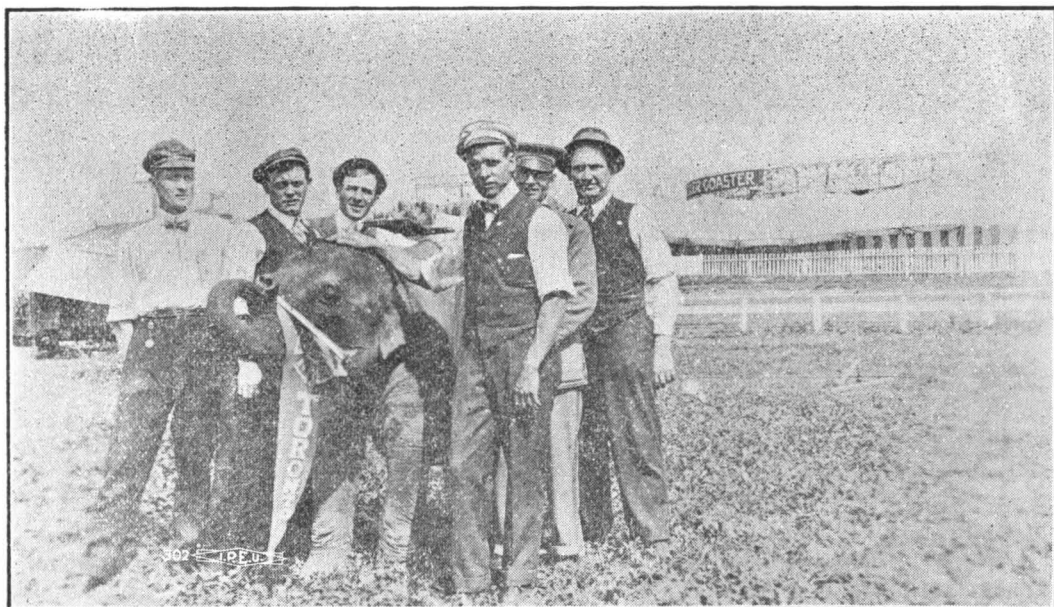
I am enclosing a picture which was taken when the Kennedy shows were in

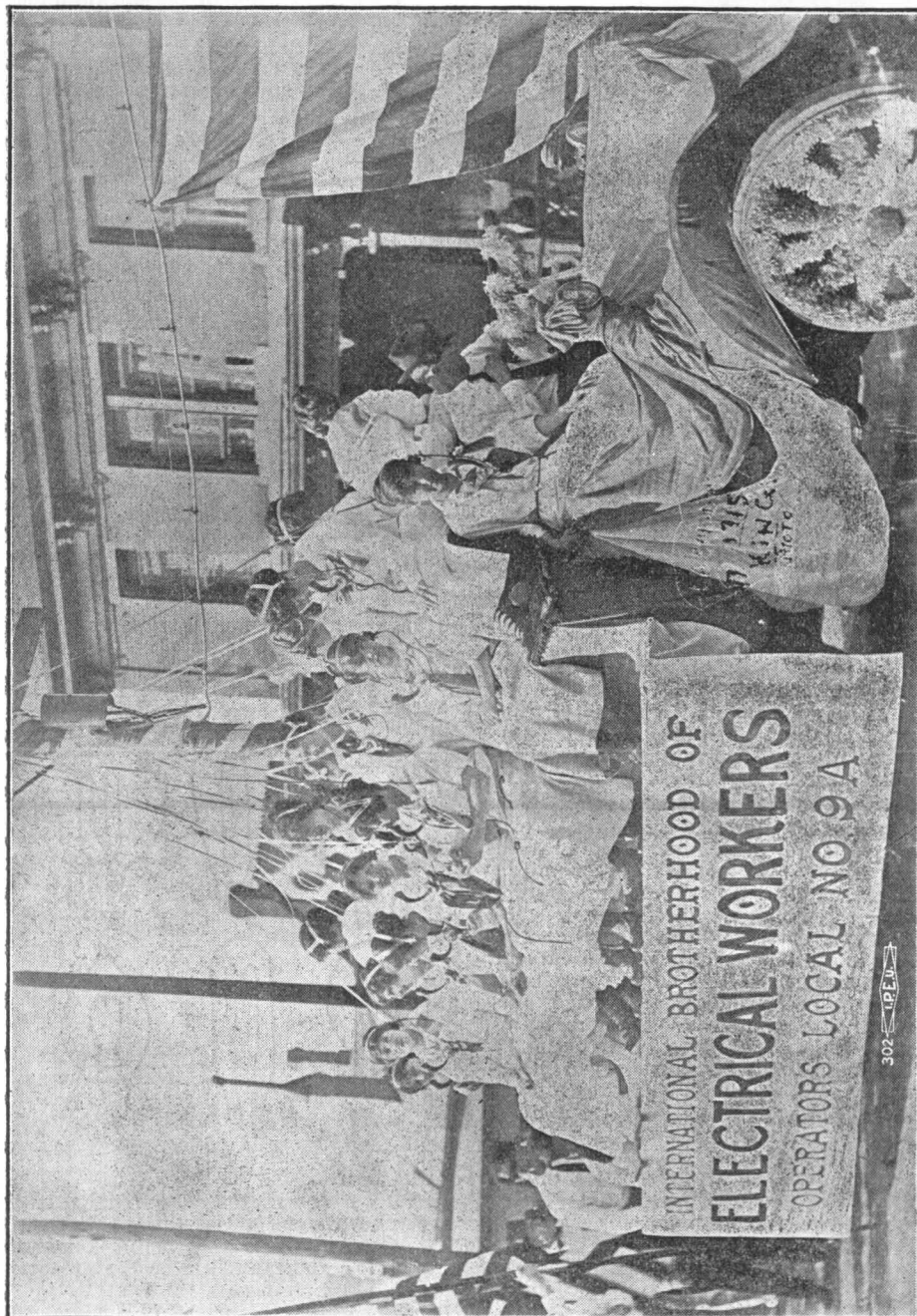

Elementary Lessons in Electricity and Magnetism

373. *Electric Candles*.—To obviate the expense and complication of such regulators, electric *candles* have been suggested by Jablochhoff, Wilde, and others. Fig. 139 depicts *Jablochhoff's candle*, consisting of two parallel pencils of hard carbon separated by a thin layer of plaster of Paris and supported in an upright holder. The arc plays across the summit between the two carbon wicks. In order that both carbons may consume at equal rates, rapidly alternating currents must be employed, which is disadvantageous from an economical point of view.

374. *Incandescent Electric Lamps*.—Voltaic arcs of an illuminating power of less than 100 candles cannot be maintained steady in practice, and are uneconomical. For small lights it is both simpler and cheaper to employ a thin continuous wire or filament of some infusible conductor, heated to whiteness by passing a current through it. Thin wires of platinum have repeatedly been suggested for this purpose, but they cannot be kept from risk of fusing. Iridium wires and thin strips of carbon have also been suggested by many inventors. Edison in 1878 devised a lamp consisting of a platinum spiral combined with a short-circuiting switch to divert the current from the lamp in case it became overheated. More recently thin filaments of carbon have been employed by Swan, Edison, Lane-Fox, Maxim, Crookes, and others for the construction of little *incandescent lamps*. In these lamps the carbon filament is mounted upon conducting wires, usually of platinum, which pass into a glass bulb, into which they are sealed, the bulbs being afterwards exhausted of air and other gases, the vacuum being made very perfect by the employment of special mercurial air-pumps. Carbon is better for this purpose than

platinum or any other metal, partly because of its superior infusibility and higher resistance, and partly because of the remarkable property of carbon of offering a lower resistance when hot than when cold. This property, which is the reverse of that observed in metals, renders it less liable to become overheated. The forms of several incandescent lamps are shown in Fig. 140. Swan (1) prepares his fila-

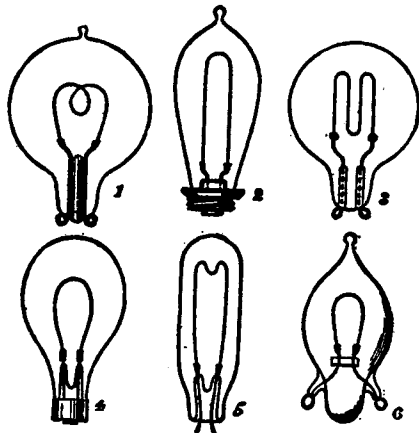

ment from cotton thread parchmensed in sulphuric acid and afterwards carbonised; such a filament becoming remarkably elastic and metal-like in the process. Edison (2) now uses a thin flat strip of carbonised bamboo instead of a filament. Maxim (3) uses a preparation of paper. Lane-Fox (4) and Akester (6) use prepared and carbonised vegetable fibres. Crookes (5) employs a filament made from animal or vegetable matter parchmensed by treatment with cuprammoniac

chloride. The resistance of such lamps varies according to size and length of the filament from 3 to 200 *ohms*. The current necessary to heat the filaments white-hot is usually from 1 to 1.3 *ampere*. To produce this current the electromotive force that must be applied is dependent on the resistance of the lamp. Suppose the lamp the resistance of which is 60 *ohms* when cold and 40 *ohms* when hot: the requisite current will be obtained by applying an electromotive force of about 50 *volts*, because $50 \div 40 = 1.25$ *ampere*. The best economy is obtained with very thin cylindrical filaments of high resistance. Flat strips of carbon which expose a disproportionate amount of surface, and thick filaments in which the mass of carbon is considerable, are open to objection. Well-made lamps, if not overheated, will last 1,000 to 1,200 hours before the filament disintegrates. It is usual to group these lamps in parallel arc between the leading main conductor and the return main, so that each lamp is independent of the others if the electromotive force of the supply is constant. The light emitted varies according to the size of lamp from 2 to 50 candles. There appears to be some difficulty in obtaining durable filaments that will bear being made incandescent to a higher candle power.

LESSON XXXIII.—*Electromotors (Electromagnetic Engines.)*

375. *Electromotors.*—Electromagnetic engines, or electromotors, are machines in which the motive power is derived from electric currents by means of electromagnets. In 1821 Faraday showed a simple case of rotation produced between a magnet and a current of electricity. In 1831 Henry, and in 1833 Ritchie, constructed electromagnetic engines producing rotation by electromagnetic means. Fig. 141 shows a modification of Ritchie's electromotor. An electromagnet DC, is poised upon a vertical axis between the poles of a fixed magnet (or electromagnet) SN. A current, generated by a suitable battery, is carried by wires which terminate in two mercury-cups, A, B, into which dip the ends of the coil of the movable electromagnet CD. When a current traverses the coil of CD it turns so as to set itself in the line between the poles NS, but as it swings round, the wires that dip into the mercury-cups pass from one cup to the opposite, so that, at the moment when C approaches S, the current in CD is reversed, and C is repelled from S and attracted round to N, the current through CD being thus reversed every half turn. In larger electromotors, the mercury-cup arrangement is replaced by a commutator, consisting of a brass ring, slit into two or more parts, and touched

at opposite points by a pair of metallic springs or "contact brushes."

In another form of electromotor, devised by Froment, bars of iron fixed upon the circumference of a rotating cylinder are attracted up towards an electromagnet, in which the current is automatically broken at the instant when each bar has

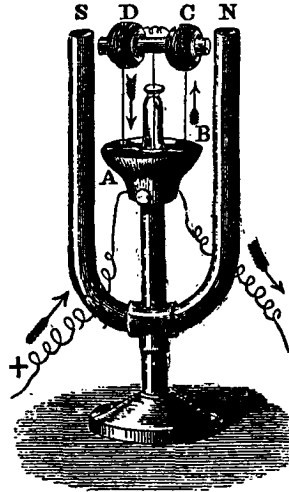

come close up to its poles. In a third kind, an electromagnet is made to attract a piece of soft iron alternately up and down, with a motion like the piston of a steam-engine, which is converted by a crank into a rotatory motion. In these cases the difficulty occurs that, as the attraction of an electromagnet falls off nearly in inverse proportion to the square of the distance from its poles, the attracting force can only produce effective motion through very small distances.

The dynamo-electric machines of Gramme, Siemens, and others, described in Arts. 407 to 411, will also work as electromotors, and, indeed, are the most efficient of electromagnetic engines.

In 1839 Jacobi propelled a boat along the river Neva at the rate of $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles per hour with an electromagnetic engine of about one horse-power, worked by a battery of 64 large Grove's cells.

In 1882 an iron screw-boat capable of carrying 12 persons, and driven by two Siemens' dynamos, with a power of about 3 horsepower, the electricity being furnished by 45 accumulators of the Sellon-Volckmar type, has been worked upon the Thames at a speed of 8 miles per hour.

Electric railways on which trains are propelled by power furnished by dynamo-electric generators stationed at some fixed point, and communicating with the electro-magnetic machinery of the train either by the rails or by a special conductor, have been constructed by Siemens in Berlin, and by Edison in Menlo Park.

376. *Electric Transmission of Power to a distance.*—The increasing use of dynamo-electric machines for electric lighting has revived the problem of transmitting power to a distance by electrical means, and so utilising waste water-power. A mountain stream may be made to turn a water-wheel or turbine, and drive a dynamo-electric machine, thereby generating currents which can be conveyed by wires to an electro-motor at a distant point, and there reconverted into mechanical power. Whether such transmission is profitable or not depends on the *efficiency* of the machines employed.

377. *Theory of Efficiency of Electro-motors.*—If a galvanometer be included in a circuit with a battery and an electro-motor, it is found that the current is *weaker* when the electromotor is working than when the electromotor is standing still, and that the faster the electromotor runs the weaker does the battery current become. This is due to electromagnetic induction (Art. 391) between the moving and fixed parts of the electromotor, which, as it spins round, generates a back-current. The electromotive-force due to this inductive action increases with the speed of the electromotor, so that the back-current is strongest when it runs fastest. If the motor be loaded so as to do work by moving slowly against considerable forces, the back-current will be small, and only a small proportion of the energy of the current will be turned into useful work. If it be set to run very quickly, so as to generate a considerable back-current, it will utilise a larger proportion of the energy of the direct current, but can only run fast enough to do this if its load be very light. Jacobi calculated that the practical efficiency lay between these two extremes, and that an electromotor would turn the energy of a battery into work in the most effective way when it was allowed to do its work at such a speed that the battery current was thereby reduced to *half* its strength. This is indeed true if it be desired to do the work at the quickest possible rate. But where economy in working is desired, and when it is not needful to get through the work as rapidly as possible, or to consume materials in the battery at a great rate, then a higher economic efficiency will be attained by making the electromotor do lighter work and spin at a greater speed; for if the electromotive-force of the battery be E volts, and the counter electromotive-force of the motor while running

be e volts, then the efficiency of the motor (that is to say, the ratio which the work it takes up from the current bears to the whole energy of the current) will

be equal to $\frac{e}{E}$. Now if the motor be al-

lowed to run more quickly e will increase proportionately, and if it runs very quickly e may become very nearly equal to E ; that is to say the motor will utilise very nearly all the energy of the current. But since, by Ohm's law, the current is = $E - e$

—, it follows that if e is very nearly

R as great as E , the current will be reduced to a small fraction of its original strength. The materials of the battery will be more slowly used, and it will take a longer time to do the total amount of the work, but the *percentage* of energy of the current turned into work will be higher. A good modern dynamo-electric machine (Art. 408) used as a motor can attain an efficiency of over 90 per cent.

378. *Cost of Working.*—The cost of working electromotors by batteries is great. A pound of zinc contains only about $\frac{1}{3}$ as much potential energy as a pound of coal, and it costs more than twenty times as much; the relative cost for equal amounts of energy is therefore about 120:1. But, as shown above, an electromagnetic engine will turn 85 per cent of the electric energy into work, while even good steam-engines only turn about 10 to 20 per cent of the energy of their fuel into work, small steam-engines being even less efficient. But, reckoning electromagnetic engines as being 5 times as "efficient" as steam-engines of equal power, the necessary zinc is still 24 times as dear as the equivalent amount of coal. This calculation does not take into account the cost of acids of the batteries. In fact, where strong currents are wanted, batteries are abandoned in favour of dynamo-electric machines, worked by steam or water power, or by gas-engines.

In the case of transmission of power, as in the preceding paragraph, the expense may be far smaller if the original water-power costs little. The dynamo-machine may turn 90 per cent of the mechanical power into the energy of electric currents, and the electromotor may convert back 85 per cent of the current energy (or 76 per cent of the original power) into work.
